Subject: Advanced Authorization for Network Switches and Wireless Access Points (WAPs)

The Purchasing and Contracting Delegation of Authority Administrative Directive, 8.50.105-AD, provides:

- All District Contracts exceeding \$150,000 shall be presented to the Board of Education on their consent agenda for approval.
- The District may seek "advanced authorization" from the PPS Board of Education for any
 contract, upon the approval of the Director of Purchasing & Contracting. The cost of the
 contract shall be a "Not to Exceed" amount. Once the Board has approved it, no further
 authorization for the contract is required, providing the contract value remains at or below the
 "Not to Exceed" amount.

When the Board provides advance authorization for a contract, it means that the contract can be signed by the Purchasing & Contracting Director as soon as it is fully negotiated and vetted by the Purchasing & Contracting department, without waiting for a subsequent Board meeting. Upon receipt of the fully negotiated contract, Purchasing & Contracting staff will undertake all steps of the standard contract review process. Contract work may begin only after the fully vetted contract is signed by authorized signers for both parties.

Staff seek advanced authorization for the following contract:

Contractor Name: Ednetics, Inc. - Lowest bidder on both contracts

Contract Amount: ITB #2021-2944 \$5,121,361.36 and #2021-2945 \$2,118,677.75

Contract Term: Two five year contracts

Short Contract Description: (1) Purchase of ethernet switching and (2) Purchase of replacement

wireless access points.

Solicitation Method: Invitations to Bid **Solicitation Issue Date:** February 3, 2021

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Contract Manager Name & Title: Don Wolff, Chief Technology Officer, Office of Technology and Information Services

Reason for advance authorization request:

These contracts are supported by ERate Category 2 funding for network switches and wireless access points. ERate regulations stipulate that all contracts must be posted for 28 days for competitive bids and that all contracts must be posted for ERate approval between January 14, 2021 and March 25, 2021.

In order to meet the ERate deadlines we are seeking pre-authorization for these contracts not to exceed \$5,121,361.36 for ITB # 2021-2944 and \$2,118,677.75 for ITB #2021-2945. Meeting the ERate guidelines will make these contracts eligible to receive 60% reimbursement from ERate funds.

These solicitations closed at 2 PM on March 4, 2021 after the 28 days open period required by ERate. The Intent to Award notifications have been sent to Ednetics, Inc. but there was not sufficient time to get full contract packages together prior to this Board meeting.

I understand that I am seeking the Board's advance approval only and that no work may begin until the proposed contract (with all attachments) is reviewed by Purchasing & Contracting and signed by authorized signers for both parties.

BACKGROUND

- A. Federal requirements call for the Governing Board of Head Starts to approve recommendations and reports for the program.
- B. The Board of Directors for Portland Public Schools serves as the Governing Board for PPS Head Start.
- C. PPS Head Start CARES Act/COVID-19 Relief Funds Carryover Request: Board Signature of Approval Needed. Federal funds were made available by Congress (CARES Act, 2020) through the Office of Head Start (OHS) in 2020. PPS Head Start received \$261,006 in CARES Act funding in 2020. On February 12, 2021, the PPS Head Start Parent Policy Council approved applying for carryover of the remaining \$79,551 to be used to prevent, prepare for, and respond to COVID-19. These funds must be spent by September 30, 2021. This timeline will be monitored by the Head Start Director and Business Operations Analyst as well as by PPS Grant Accounting.

ANALYSIS OF SITUATION

Items listed above support the high quality, comprehensive services provided to the children and families enrolled in PPS Head Start.

FISCAL IMPACT

CARES Act/COVID-19 Relief funds will continue to support PPS Head Start's efforts to prevent, prepare for, and respond to COVID-19 during comprehensive distance learning, limited in-person instruction, and potential reopening of in-person instruction. In addition, PPS Head Start may offer and operate a supplemental summer program during summer 2021 if conditions permit. Expenses will include staff salaries, children's snacks, and costs for materials and supplies. Expenses will be covered by carryover funds.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT (IF APPLICABLE)

PPS Head Start Parent Policy Council reviewed, provided input, and approved these actions/documents on February 12, 2021 as noted above.

TIMELINE FOR IMPLEMENTATION / EVALUATION

The timeline for implementation will be the 2020-2021 fiscal cycle with a deadline of September 30, 2021.

BOARD OPTIONS WITH ANALYSIS

Board approval needed.

CONNECTION TO BOARD GOALS

The goal of PPS Head Start is to prepare the city's most diverse young children for successful transitions to kindergarten and beyond by leveraging each child's strengths, building their social competence, and developing school readiness skills.



Resolution Approving Renewal of the Charter Agreement with Opal Charter School

RECITALS

- A. In January 2001, Portland Public Schools (District) Board of Education (Board) passed Resolution 1713 approving Opal Charter School's original charter application to the District and instructed staff to negotiate a five-year charter contract.
- B. On March 13, 2006, the Portland Public School Board ("Board") approved Resolution 3469 to renew the contract with Opal Charter School ("Opal") for five years.
- C. On March 28, 2011, the Portland Public School Board ("Board") approved Resolution 4436 to renew the contract with Opal Charter School ("Opal") under a "flexible five-to-ten-year" agreement.
- D. On January 2, 2021, Opal Charter School delivered its application for renewal of its charter agreement consistent with ORS 338.065.
- E. The process and criteria for considering the renewal of a charter are described in ORS 338.065, including a requirement that the first renewal of a charter must be for the same term as the initial charter, and all future renewals must be for a term of no less than five and no more than 10 years.
- F. The District Charter School Program Director reviewed Opal's renewal request in good faith using criteria consistent with ORS 338.065(6), which require an evaluation of whether the public charter school is:
 - a. in compliance with ORS Chapter 338 and all other applicable state and federal laws;
 - b. in compliance with the charter of the public charter school;
 - c. meeting or working toward meeting the student performance goals and agreements specified in the charter or in any other written agreements between the District and Opal Charter School:
 - d. fiscally stable and has used the sound financial management system described in the proposal and incorporated into the written charter; and
 - e. in compliance with any other renewal criteria specified in the charter.
- G. On February 11, 2021, the Board Charter Schools and Alternative Programs Committee held a public hearing to hear Opal Charter School's charter renewal request.
- H. On March 9, 2021, after reviewing the information presented by Opal Charter School in support of its renewal request, including information from the public hearing and the staff report, Superintendent Guerrero recommended that the District renew the charter agreement with Opal Charter School. A copy of the Superintendent's recommendation is on file at the District Board office.

RESOLUTIONS

- The Board of Education for Portland Public Schools has determined that Opal Charter School's request to renew its charter meets the criteria of ORS Chapter 338.
- 2. The Board of Education for Portland Public Schools directs staff to negotiate a ten-year charter agreement between the District and Opal Charter School that is consistent with ORS Chapter 338 and with District policies, is in a form approved by the District's General Counsel, and that includes the following provisions:
 - a. The contract with Opal Charter School shall be for a maximum enrollment of 250 students in grades K-5.
 - b. Opal Charter School will receive pass-through of State School Funds (SSF) equivalent to at least the statutory minimum rate for K-8 of 80% of the Charter School Rate. PPS charter schools serving student populations of 50% or greater historically underserved by

race/ethnicity currently receive pass-through of 95% of the Charter School Rate for K-8 students.

- c. Opal Charter School will provide evidence satisfactory to the District that:
 - Sources of donations and grants are reasonably assured and that there is a plan in place for supplementing funds received from the State School Fund as necessary;
 - ii. Opal Charter School has a contingency plan in place if revenues are significantly less than or expenses are significantly more than projected, or if there is a significant cut in the SSF charter school rate; and
 - iii. Each school year's budget will be amended and resubmitted to the District when there are any significant changes to the SSF charter school rate.
- d. Opal Charter School will consult with District Charter Schools Office and/or other District staff as necessary when determining any change in school location during the term of the contract, prior to any lease or purchase agreement being finalized.
- e. Opal Charter School will work with District staff to formulate a plan to increase dissemination of best educational practices to include more PPS teachers and administrators.
- The Board of Education for Portland Public Schools directs the Superintendent to report to the Board each year on Opal Charter School's compliance with the terms of the charter agreement. This report may be part of an overall report for all District-sponsored charter schools.

BACKGROUND

Opal Charter School opened in 2001 as the first charter school in Portland Public Schools. Opal School operates as a program of the Portland Children's Museum, currently serving 89 students in grades K-5. The school's instructional program is guided by the work of early childhood educators in Reggio Emilia, Italy, neuroscience research, and constructivist practices. The Opal School, through its association with the Museum Center for Learning, operates as a research lab and professional development hub for educators worldwide, who take part in Opal's Summer Symposium and Visitation Days during the school year.

Opal Charter School is in its 20th year of operation, having successfully applied for charter renewals in 2006 and 2011. The school is currently operating under a five-to-ten-year "flexible" agreement which has been extended annually to reach the statutory 10th year limit, and will terminate on June 30, 2021.

Opal Charter School formally submitted an Application for Renewal of its charter with the District on January 2, 2021 per ORS 338.065(5)(b). On February 13, 2021, the Board Charter Schools and Alternative Programs Committee held a public hearing in consideration of Opal's renewal request, as per ORS 338.065(5)(c). Per ORS 338.065(4)(c), this renewal term "shall be for a minimum of five years but may not exceed 10 years." Opal has requested a ten-year renewal of its charter.

The staff recommendation is based on information gathered from annual site visits, the renewal hearing, Opal's Annual Performance Framework and Report, and other information obtained during the renewal period.

RELATED POLICIES/BEST PRACTICES

Charter school renewals are governed by ORS 338.065, OAR 581-026-0400 and Board Policy 6.70.010-P. The sponsor must base the renewal evaluation primarily on a good faith review of the public charter school's annual performance reports, annual audit of accounts, and annual site visit and review. The criteria a school district board must use to determine whether or not to renew a charter school are listed in ORS 338.065(8)(a-b) and are as follows:

Whether the public charter school:

- A. Is in compliance with this chapter and all other state and federal laws: The criteria are met. Opal Charter School has not been out of compliance with ORS 338 or any other applicable state or federal laws during the current charter term.
- B. **Is in compliance with the charter of the public charter school.** The criteria are met. Opal is implementing its educational program as described in its charter.
- C. Is meeting or working toward meeting the student performance goals and agreements specified in the charter or any other written agreements between the sponsor and the public charter school governing body. The criteria are met. Opal has met or is working toward meeting the student performance goals during the term of its current charter.
- D. Is fiscally stable and has used the sound financial management system described in the proposal submitted under ORS 338.045 and incorporated into the written charter under this section. The criteria are met. The school has received clean audits every year of the current charter term, is timely with financial deliverables, and has maintained financial stability through the current contract term.
- E. Is in compliance with any renewal criteria specific in the charter of the public charter school. The criteria are met.

ANALYSIS OF SITUATION

Implications of approving recommendation to renew charter school: Staff will begin negotiating new contract per Board Resolution instructions.

Implications of declining recommendation to renew charter school: The charter with Opal School will expire on June 30, 2021, and barring further action, the school will close. The charter school may appeal the PPS Board decision to the State Board of Education for review (ORS 338.065(6)(a)).

FISCAL IMPACT

As per ORS 338.155(2)(a), charter schools serving grades K-8 receive a minimum of 80% of the per-student State School Fund allocation. Additional weights to this allocation include those for poverty (based on census data), for students qualifying for ESL services, and for students qualifying for teen parent services.

Opal School's financial stability is due in part to its relationship with the Portland Children's Museum, which leases its building at essentially no cost, allowing Opal School to operate with very low facilities costs. That lease will expire during the term of the next charter, and Opal has requested an enrollment capacity increase from 92 to 250 to allow the school an economy of scale and flexibility to search for a new facility. This increase, if approved, is planned to be phased in over the span of the new charter contract. Opal is projected to enroll 92 students in grades K-5 in the 2021-22 school year, and is projected to receive \$642,804 in State School Funds at current enrollment (assuming 80% of current Charter Schools Rate per-student allocation of \$8,734). See table below for possible scenarios for a phased-in increased enrollment and the associated yearly fiscal impact.

The chart shows fiscal impacts of two example scenarios under which Opal Charter School may choose to increase enrollment; there are many other options, including not growing to the full 250 enrollment if the school decides is not needed. The first scenario in the chart shows enrollment increases beginning in 2022-23 with gradual increases yearly until 2028-29, when full enrollment is reached; the second is beginning in 2025-26 with sharper increases until full enrollment in 2030-31 (the final year of the new charter contract). Opal Charter School reports that full enrollment of 250 may not be required, depending on size and cost of a new location. The flexibility to increase enrollment *up to 250* as needed to meet financial obligations of a new facility, if and when one is found, is essential for Opal School's continued planning for fiscal sustainability. In any and all scenarios Opal School is required to continue to work closely with the Charter Office and Multiple Pathways to Graduation leadership, who will continue to update the Superintendent and Charter Schools and Alternative Programs Board Committee as plans for enrollment increases develop.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT (IF APPLICABLE)

Opal Charter School submitted its renewal application according to statutory timelines. District staff completed an annual performance review, and submitted this to Opal for input and response. District staff has performed multiple school site visits, including meetings with school staff, students, and parents. On February 11, 2021, the Board Charter Schools Committee held the required public hearing where public comment was submitted in support of renewal.

Opal Charter School has been reviewed on an annual basis by staff in three major areas: academic, organizational, and financial. Staff has determined that Opal is meeting statutory and contractual requirements.

TIMELINE FOR IMPLEMENTATION / EVALUATION

The Board is scheduled to discuss Opal's renewal at its meeting on March 9, 2021, with a vote scheduled at the same meeting.

If the renewal request is approved, staff will begin negotiating the new contract with Opal per instructions of the Board Resolution. The current contract expires on June 30, 2021.

BOARD OPTIONS WITH ANALYSIS

Results of a yes vote: the Board will direct staff to negotiate a ten-year charter agreement per the terms of the Resolution.

Results of a no vote: the charter contract will expire effective June 30, 2021, and barring further action the school will close. The charter school may appeal the decision of the PPS Board to the State Board of Education for review (ORS 338.065(6)(a)).

CONNECTION TO BOARD GOALS

Board goals for Third Grade Reading growth and Fifth Grade Mathematics growth are connected to achievement standards for K-5 charter schools. Charter schools must meet District average achievement for the same populations, as reported on the Oregon Report Card and the Charter Schools Annual Performance Framework and Report.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends that the contract with Opal Charter School be renewed for a ten-year term, to expire on June 30, 2031.

As a member of the PPS Executive Leadership Team, I have reviewed this staff report.

 - d. fiscally stable and has used the sound financial management system described in the proposal and incorporated into the written charter; and
 - e. in compliance with any other renewal criteria specified in the charter.
- G. On February 11, 2021, the Board Charter Schools and Alternative Programs Committee held a public hearing to hear Portland Arthur Academy's charter renewal request.
- H. On March 9, 2021, after reviewing the information presented by Portland Arthur Academy in support of its renewal request, including information from the public hearing and the staff report, Superintendent Guerrero recommended that the District renew the charter agreement with Portland Arthur Academy. A copy of the Superintendent's recommendation is on file at the District Board office.

RESOLUTIONS

- 1. The Board of Education for Portland Public Schools has determined that Portland Arthur Academy's request to renew its charter meets the criteria of ORS Chapter 338.
- 2. The Board of Education for Portland Public Schools directs staff to negotiate a ten-year charter agreement between the District and Portland Arthur Academy that is consistent with ORS Chapter 338 and with District policies, is in a form approved by the District's General Counsel, and that includes the following provisions:
 - a. The contract with Portland Arthur Academy shall be for a maximum enrollment of 180 students in grades K-5.

- b. Portland Arthur Academy will receive pass-through of State School Funds (SSF) equivalent to at least the statutory minimum rate for K-8 of 80% of the Charter School Rate. PPS charter schools serving student populations of 50% or greater historically underserved by race/ethnicity currently receive pass-through of 95% of the Charter School Rate for K-8 students.
- c. Portland Arthur Academy will provide evidence satisfactory to the District that:
 - Sources of donations and grants are reasonably assured and that there is a plan in place for supplementing funds received from the State School Fund as necessary;
 - ii. Portland Arthur Academy has a contingency plan in place if revenues are significantly less than or expenses are significantly more than projected, or if there is a significant cut in the SSF charter school rate; and
 - iii. Each school year's budget will be amended and resubmitted to the District when there are any significant changes to the SSF charter school rate.
- d. Portland Arthur Academy will consult with District Charter Schools Office and/or other District staff as necessary when determining any change in school location during the term of the contract, prior to any lease or purchase agreement being finalized.
- e. Portland Arthur Academy will work with District staff to formulate a plan to increase dissemination of best educational practices to include more PPS teachers and administrators.
- The Board of Education for Portland Public Schools directs the Superintendent to report to the Board
 each year on Portland Arthur Academy's compliance with the terms of the charter agreement. This
 report may be part of an overall report for all District-sponsored charter schools.

Subject: Charter School Renewal Recommendation for Portland Arthur Academy

BACKGROUND

Portland Arthur Academy Charter School is a k-5 charter school in SE Portland, housed on the Ascension Catholic Church campus, enrolling 175 students. The school uses a research-based, Direct Instruction model that focuses students through a highly organized, incremental curriculum and ensures they master each skill before moving on to the next. Portland Arthur Academy is one of six Arthur Academies in the greater Portland area, which share a common curriculum, a single board of directors, and a central administrative office.

Portland Arthur Academy opened in 2005, and is in its 16th year of operation. It successfully applied for charter renewal in 2008 and 2011. The school is currently operating under a five-to-ten-year "flexible" agreement which has been extended annually to reach the statutory 10th year limit, and will terminate on June 30, 2021.

Portland Arthur Academy formally submitted an Application for Renewal of its charter with the District on January 2, 2021 per ORS 338.065(5)(b). On February 13, 2021, the Board Charter Schools and Alternative Programs Committee held a public hearing in consideration of Portland Arthur Academy's renewal request, as per ORS 338.065(5)(c). Per ORS 338.065(4)(c), this renewal term "shall be for a minimum of five years but may not exceed 10 years." Portland Arthur Academy has requested a ten-year renewal of its charter.

The staff recommendation is based on information gathered from the annual site visits, the renewal hearing, Portland Arthur Academy's Annual Performance Framework and Report, and other information obtained during the renewal period.

RELATED POLICIES/BEST PRACTICES

Charter school renewals are governed by ORS 338.065, OAR 581-026-0400 and Board Policy 6.70.010-P. The sponsor must base the renewal evaluation primarily on a good faith review of the public charter school's annual performance reports, annual audit of accounts, and annual site visit and review. The criteria a school district board must use to determine whether or not to renew a charter school are listed in ORS 338.065(8)(a-e) and are as follows:

Whether the public charter school:

- A. Is in compliance with this chapter and all other state and federal laws: The criteria are met. Portland Arthur Academy Charter School has not been out of compliance with ORS 338 or any other applicable state or federal laws during the current charter term.
- B. **Is in compliance with the charter of the public charter school.** The criteria are met. Portland Arthur Academy is implementing its educational program as described in its charter.
- C. Is meeting or working toward meeting the student performance goals and agreements specified in the charter or any other written agreements between the sponsor and the public charter school governing body. The criteria are met. Portland Arthur Academy has met or is working toward meeting the student performance goals during the term of its current charter.
- D. Is fiscally stable and has used the sound financial management system described in the proposal submitted under ORS 338.045 and incorporated into the written charter under this section. The criteria are met. The school has received clean audits every year of the current charter term, is timely with financial deliverables, and has maintained financial stability through the current contract term.
- E. Is in compliance with any renewal criteria specific in the charter of the public charter school. The criteria are met.

ANALYSIS OF SITUATION

Implications of approving recommendation to renew charter school: Staff will begin negotiating new contract per Board Resolution instructions.

Implications of declining recommendation to renew charter school: The charter with Portland Arthur Academy will expire on June 30, 2021, and barring further action, the school will close. The charter school may appeal the PPS Board decision to the State Board of Education for review (ORS 338.065(6)(a)).

FISCAL IMPACT

As per ORS 338.155(2)(a), charter schools serving grades K-8 receive a minimum of 80% of the per-student State School Fund allocation. Additional weights to this allocation include those for poverty (based on census data), for students qualifying for ESL services, and for students qualifying for teen parent services.

Portland Arthur Academy is projected to enroll 180 students in grades K-5 in the 2021-22 school year, and is projected to receive \$1,257,660 in State School Funds at current enrollment (assuming statutory minimum 80% pass through amount of current Charter School Rate per-student allocation of \$8,734).

Portland Arthur Academy has requested within their renewal application that the Board of Education consider increasing the pass-through rate from the statutory minimum of 80% to 90% of per-student allocation. Staff recommends that consideration of an increase in the

pass-through rate to charter schools be separated from the decision about charter renewal, which is determined by consideration of statutory criteria in ORS 338.065(8).

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT (IF APPLICABLE)

Portland Arthur Academy Charter School submitted its renewal application according to statutory timelines. District staff completed an annual performance review, and submitted this to Portland Arthur Academy for input and response. District staff has performed multiple school site visits, including meetings with school staff, students, and parents. On February 11, 2021, the Board Charter Schools Committee held the required public hearing where public comment was submitted in support of renewal.

Portland Arthur Academy has been reviewed on an annual basis by staff in three major areas: academic, organizational, and financial. Staff has determined that Portland Arthur Academy is meeting statutory and contractual requirements.

TIMELINE FOR IMPLEMENTATION / EVALUATION

The Board is scheduled to discuss Portland Arthur Academy's renewal at its meeting on March 9, 2021, with a vote scheduled at the same meeting.

If the renewal request is approved, staff will begin negotiating the new contract with Portland Arthur Academy per instructions of the Board Resolution. The current contract expires on June 30, 2021.

BOARD OPTIONS WITH ANALYSIS

Results of a yes vote: the Board will direct staff to negotiate a ten-year charter agreement per the terms of the Resolution.

Results of a no vote: the charter contract will expire effective June 30, 2021, and barring further action the school will close. The charter school may appeal the decision of the PPS Board to the State Board of Education for review (ORS 338.065(6)(a)).

CONNECTION TO BOARD GOALS

Board goals for Third Grade Reading growth and Fifth Grade Mathematics growth are connected to achievement standards for K-5 charter schools. Charter schools must meet District average achievement for the same populations, as reported on the Oregon Report Card and the Charter Schools Annual Performance Framework and Report.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends that the contract with Portland Arthur Academy Charter School be renewed for a ten-year term, to expire on June 30, 2031.

BACKGROUND

Originally presented and approved in 2018 as the Comprehensive Sexuality Education Policy (CSEP) with a statute stating that it would be reviewed every 2 years. Based on current best practices it was recommended that the CSEP be embedded in a larger policy around Comprehensive Health Education.

Portland Public School District (PPS) is committed to creating safe and healthy learning environments to support the growth and development of every student. The development of health literacy, the ability to access, understand, appraise, apply and advocate for health information and services in order to maintain or enhance one's own health and the health of others, is necessary for students to be healthy throughout their lives.

Health education is an integral component of quality school programming. Schools have direct contact with a significant number of Portland's youth for about 6 hours a day and for the critical years of students' social, psychological, physical and intellectual development. As a result, schools play an important role in improving students' health and social outcomes as well as promoting academic success (CDC Healthy Schools). Healthy students are more ready and able to learn and are less likely to experience negative academic impact (e.g. academic failure, lower test scores, truancy, absenteeism) than students who engage in risky health behaviors. According to the CDC, schools cannot achieve their primary mission of education if students are not healthy, and schools can address the health needs of students in part through effective health education. Research supports that school health programs and policies may be one of the most efficient ways to reduce risky behaviors in students, prevent health problems and address the achievement gap. Portland Public Schools believe that in accordance with the National Health Education Standards, "health education should contribute directly to a student's ability to successfully practice behaviors that protect and promote health and avoid or reduce health risks". We also recognize that skills are the foundation of effective health education instruction and that comprehensive school health education assists students in living healthier lives. The policy presented here explains how we, in Portland Public Schools, will create effective health education programming.

ANALYSIS OF SITUATION

Our goal is to revise the current Comprehensive Sexuality Education Policy to be inclusive of the many laws, mandates, and policies that support Comprehensive Health Education. We propose transitioning from a stand alone CSEP to a Comprehensive Health Education policy which includes a section specific to comprehensive sexuality education. According to Oregon statute, comprehensive sexuality education policies must be reviewed every 2 years which is written into the current policy revision. This shift was presented to the board policy subcommittee who agreed with this approach.

FISCAL IMPACT

All related fiscal impacts are embedded in the current budget. Part of the original policy included a corresponding professional development implication, which is now embedded in the Health and Physical Education budget.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT (IF APPLICABLE)

Through grant dollars from Advocates for Youth, the District involved community organizations and students through several processes. State, county, and community-based organizations focused on youth sexual health and healthy relationships provided guidance and feedback on the draft Comprehensive Sexuality Education Policy in two facilitated meetings. In the first meeting (February 2018), partners were provided with contextual information on the statutory requirements of the policy, and provided comment and direct feedback to the draft policy. In the second meeting (March 2018) partners confirmed the edits, discussed the implications for the administrative directive, and need for professional development systems. PPS students were engaged through the development of the student "Bill of Rights" document. Two listening sessions were held with middle and high school students at the PPS GSA Summit in April. Additionally, an online survey was available for two weeks in April and was distributed through student health center youth action councils, school counselors across the District and marketed during the GSA summit. A total of 90 students participated in the online survey. After online and in-person data collection commenced at the end of April, Planned Parenthood of the Columbia Willamette's Teen Council was engaged to identify common themes and develop the final statements that make up the "Youth Bill of Rights".

TIMELINE FOR IMPLEMENTATION / EVALUATION

Completed.

BOARD OPTIONS WITH ANALYSIS

Accept the comprehensive approach articulated in this proposed policy.

Reject and return to a stand alone policy of comprehensive sexuality education.

CONNECTION TO BOARD GOALS

In Board Goals 3 and 4 we see our vision for how students can thrive and experience success related to this Policy. Goal three focuses on the skills and knowledge students should have by the end of middle school. Specifically called out in the Goal is "a particular focus on students' socio-emotional development and health" In Board Goal 4, which focuses on the skills and knowledge we want students to have by graduation it "identifies those skills and dispositions that we collectively believe every PPS student graduate should possess. We also believe that every student needs to have the core academic knowledge and opportunity of experience that will prepare them for post-secondary success." Health Education is a core graduation requirement, but more importantly, it helps students realize aspects of the PPS Graduate Portrait.

In PPS, our vision for our graduates is that they be **Positive, Confident, and Connected** with positive feelings about their personal and cultural identities and a healthy sense of confidence and self-worth. Sense of Self-Cultural sensitivity and inclusivity are a major component of the Health Standards and are core to this policy. Youth of color and LGBTQ+ youth were integral to

the creation of the Student Bill of Rights. Additionally, racial, ethnic, and LGBTQ+ diverse community groups were pivotal to the creation of the original Policy.



PPS requires students in grades K through 12 be taught Comprehensive Health Education that is medically-accurate, age and developmentally appropriate, culturally and linguistically sustaining, and implemented in safe and supportive learning environments where all students feel valued. All Portland Public Schools shall take a skills-based approach¹ to teach comprehensive health education that addresses a variety of topics, such as tobacco, alcohol, and other drug use/abuse, healthy eating/nutrition, mental and emotional health, personal health and wellness, physical

¹ Skills-based health education is "an approach to creating or maintaining healthy lifestyles and conditions through the development of knowledge, attitudes, and especially skills, using a variety of learning experiences, with an emphasis on participatory methods" (World Health Organization, 2003, p. 3).



activity, safety and injury prevention, violence prevention, and comprehensive sexual health education that is LGBTQ inclusive.

Comprehensive health education curriculum shall be modified as needed for students with disabilities and students who are English Language Learners. It shall promote healthy lifestyle habits, healthy relationships and health literacy for all students. Health education curricula will align with the PPS scope and sequence, which integrates Oregon Laws and Health Education Standards. Qualified and trained teachers will implement curricula.

Review of Policy and Comprehensive Sexuality Education Plan (CSEP)

District will utilize relevant district staff, local, state and national data, emerging best practices, new scientific information, and effective education strategies to review and update the comprehensive sexuality education plan of instruction and this policy every two years as prescribed by OAR 581-022-2050.

Portland Public School District (PPS) is committed to creating safe and healthy learning environments to support the growth and development of every student. The development of health Health literacy, the ability to access, understand, appraise, apply and advocate for health information and services in order to maintain or enhance one's own health and the health of others, is a critical component of education in PPS; one that is necessary to build skills and provide functional knowledge for students to be healthy throughout their lives. PPS also recognizes the role of inclusive and comprehensive sexuality education in promoting health equity, supportinghealthy development, and preventing violence.

Oregon's Human Sexuality Law (ORS 336.455, 2009), the Healthy Teen-Relationship Act (ORS 339.366, 2013), and Child Sexual Abuse Prevention Law (ORS 336.059, 2015) collectively contribute to the Oregon Department of Education's (ODE) Human Sexuality AdministrativeRule (OAR-581-022-2050) and health education content standards and performance indicators. Under these laws, school districts are required to provide "a comprehensive plan of instruction focusing on human sexualityeducation" which is "complete, balanced, and medically accurate". Alignedto national standards, Oregon's performance indicators are additionally aimed at preventing sexual violence and promoting student safety. For example, the law requires that instruction recognize a diversity of sexual orientations, gender identities, and gender expressions, as well as focus on affirmative consent. The Oregon health education content standards ensure that comprehensive sexuality education teaches students positive attitudes and behaviors related to healthy relationships and sexuality, by using age-appropriate, and culturally inclusive materials, language, and methods.

The Portland Public Schools Comprehensive Sexuality Education Policy and the Portland Public Schools Comprehensive Sexuality Education Plan were developed by teachers, school administrators, local and state healthdepartments, staff and other professionals from the medical community knowledgeable of the latest scientific information and effective education strategies and in accordance with federal, state, and district laws, policies, health education standards, local and district data sources, and current best practices.

Specifically, research shows that effective comprehensive sexualityeducation leads to a delay in the initiation and frequency of sex, reduces the number of Portland's new partners, and increases the correct use of barrier and contraception methods. Highly effective sex education and STI prevention education programs:

- Recognize the harm caused to sexual health by racism, homophobia, transphobia and other forms of oppression;
- Offer developmentally- and culturally appropriate sexual health information in a safe and inclusive environment;
- Are developed in cooperation with members of the community, especially a diverse representation of young people;

BACKGROUND

In 1971 the Board adopted a policy for the Disposition of Surplus Real Property that outlines the procedure for the preservation and rare disposal of any real property that is not essential to the District's mission now or ever. The policy has been amended seven times since 1971, most recently in November of 2018.

The current policy requires real estate transactions be presented to the Board for approval, but does provide the Superintendent or his/her designee authority to sign real estate transactions in which the total value of the transaction is at or below applicable delegation thresholds for District expenditure and revenue contracts, as set forth in PPS Public Contracting Rule 45-0200 (Authority to Approve and Execute District Contracts) <u>and</u> contains a clause that provides the District the right to terminate the contract with thirty days (30) days' notice without cause.

As proposed, the amended policy is substantially enhanced and outlines the Board's intent more clearly. It also provides criteria for justifying less than market terms under extraordinary economic circumstances. More specific changes are as follows:

- Acknowledges that the District's real property assets are on the traditional land of the Chinook, Clackamas, Kalapuya, Multnomah, Wasco, Kathlamet, Tualatin, and Molalla tribes:
- Acknowledges that Portland institutions and citizens participated in redlining and structurally organized policies, zoning, and planning that restricted or prevented Black, Indigenous, and communities of color from land ownership and led to their disproportionate displacement through "urban renewal" or gentrification;
- Aligns the policy more closely with the District's Racial Equity and Social Justice goals;
- Strongly affirms that only on rare occasions will the District sell a real property without replacing that property with an equivalent or better property;

- Provides additional guidance and clarity around the preservation and disposition of District real property and specific evaluation criteria to guide decisions that may deviate from current market terms;
- Allows staff to efficiently convey real property rights-of-way or easements that are imposed as a condition of approval of District development and maintenance projects; and
- Allows staff to negotiate contracts, without Board approval, at or below applicable delegation thresholds for District expenditure and revenue contracts if they provide a termination right with ninety (90) days' or less notice.

On March 8, 2021, the Board Policy Committee will consider a proposed amendment to the policy which was first read by the Board on February 9, 2021, which:

 Expressly connects our Racial Equity and Social Justice goals to sales and leases of our properties and makes proof of financial need under extraordinary circumstances one of several factors to consider.

RELATED POLICIES/BEST PRACTICES

8.70.043-AD Process for Disposing of Surplus Real Property 8.70.044-P Capital Asset Renewal Funds and Plans

It is best practice for public educational institutions to retain its real estate assets for both foreseeable and unforeseeable changes in space demands and enrollment. Favorable tax structure and various lease opportunities can also provide a favorable income stream on idle assets.

ANALYSIS OF SITUATION

Operationally, the proposed changes to the Policy 8.70.040-P Preservation, Maintenance, and Disposition of District Real Property provide a clear direction that the sale of a District property is an unlikely event and will require a thorough analysis of the implications on fulfillment of the District's educational mission over the next 100 years. It also directs a strong preference that any long-term disposition of District property be in the form of a long-term lease rather than a sale, and that, in the rare event of a sale, the District should replace the sold property with an equivalent or better property.

The proposed policy changes also provide specific evaluation criteria that the Board must consider if deviating from current market lease terms.

FISCAL IMPACT

Adoption and implementation of this policy may result in lost revenues, but may also provide direct benefit both monetary and otherwise to the District. Development of the Administrative Directive will codify the process that staff should follow in the consideration of transactions involving District real estate. All real estate transactions valued at \$150,000 or greater or that have termination clauses greater than ninety (90) days will be submitted to the Board for

approval, except in the instance where a transaction is imposed as a condition (*i.e.*, a utility or right-of-way easement) of approval of District development and maintenance projects.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

The policy was amended over several months and in public meetings under the direction of the Board Policy Committee that includes two student representatives. PPS Senior Director of Racial Equity & Social Justice provided useful input on different approaches to land policy from tribal representatives at other public entities.

The proposed policy was unanimously approved to move forward to the first reading at the February 9 Board Meeting. At the February 17 Board Policy Committee meeting Director Brim-Edwards indicated that she would be bringing forward an amendment that would be shared with the Committee Chair and the rest of the committee prior to the March 9 Board Policy Committee meeting and discussed the nature of the amendment. If approved by the Board Policy Committee at the meeting on March 8, the full Board will consider the revised policy for a second reading at the March 9 board meeting.

TIMELINE FOR IMPLEMENTATION / EVALUATION

The policy is effective immediately upon final adoption by the Board.

- C. On January 25, 2021, the Policy Committee reviewed the revisions to the policy and the engagement efforts and recommended that the policy be forwarded to the full Board for adoption.
- D. On February 9, 2021, the Board held a first reading of the proposed policy, and it was posted on the Board website for public comment. There has been no public comment on the proposed policy.
- E. On March 8, 2021, the Policy Committee approved additional amendments to the proposed policy for consideration by the full Board.

- · Reflect the District's short-, intermediate-, and long-term educational and operational needs, considering long-term population and enrollment projections for the Portland area;
- · Maintain flexibility in lease terms to allow for early termination to adjust to enrollment fluctuations or other District needs for the property; and
- · Provide revenue and other support for District needs; in this case, the District must seek maximum long-term financial and other benefits. The District also recognizes that conveyance of real property rights-of-way or easements may be imposed as a condition of approval of District development projects without compensation or may occur for other good or valuable consideration.

D. Sale of Real Property

Under ORS 332.155, the District may lease, sell, and convey all property of the District

_that will not be required for the District's educational purposes in the long term. In the unlikely event that District property does not support <u>and is not expected to support</u> the District's mission now or in the future, the Superintendent shall recommend to the Board the disposal of such property, including a thorough analysis of the implications of any property sale on <u>fulfilmentfulfillment</u> of the District's educational mission over the long term. <u>Selling a District property without replacing it with an equivalent or better property shall be a last resort</u>.

The Board of Education directs the following:

- 1. Superintendent's Real Property Sale Recommendation: The Superintendentshall develop and adopt an administrative directive establishing a process for developing recommendations to the Board on the sale of any District property. The process shall include at a minimum the following components:
 - a. Notification of the Board of Education.
 - b. A summary of the factors considered in the development of the recommendation, including a market and needs analysis.

Sale of District Property Recommendation-Whenever possible, any long-term disposition of District property should take the form of a long-term lease rather than a sale. A "long-term lease" is defined as a lease of at least five years and shall provide the District termination rights in the event the property is needed for District use.

Sale of a District property without replacing it with an equivalent or better property is usually disfavored and shall be considered only after assessing alternatives and determining that the District's best long-term interests are served by a sale. Whenever possible, any District property sale should be to a public entity that intends to actively use the property for public purposes or that substantially advances the District's racial equity and social justice goals for public schools, including PPS charter schools provided that any transaction is structured to allow PPS to regain ownership of the real property if it is no longer going to be used for public or designated purposes.

Public Hearing: Any process to consider the sale of the property shall be a transparent and public process, and at least one public hearing shall be held by the Board prior to declaring any real property or portion thereof appropriate prudent and necessary for sale. If the unlikely event the Board determines that it is prudent or necessary to sell a District property is appropriate for sale, it shall pass a resolution identifying the property, how relinquishing property promotes both the District's mission and the and the public interest, and the terms and conditions under which it may be sold.
- 3.c. Sale process: Once the property is declared appropriate for sale by the Board Board declares that it is prudent or necessary to sell a District property, the Superintendent, or such persons as may be designated by the Superintendent, shall establish and conduct a process for sale or other conveyance of the property. The Superintendent will market and negotiate a proposed sale or other conveyance of the property and bring a recommended agreement to the Board for the Board's review and approval.

E. PPS Leases

1. Presumption of Market Rate: Unless Terms:

When entering into leases involving real property, the District shall pursue maximum market value and other then-current market terms, unless the Board adopts a resolution that makes an express finding that the disposition of transaction involving District property for less than market rateterms (1) confers significant benefit to the District and the communities it serves, the District shall pursue maximum market value, including, but not limited to whether the transaction advances the goals of the District's Racial Educational Equity policy; and (2) is with another party with an official connection to the District or its enrolled students or students expected to enroll in PPS (e.g., PPS charter school, an organization providing direct services to PPS students, or a prekindergarten or head start program). Any express finding justifying less than market terms shall also consider the factors or combination of factors below and be assessed through the PPS Racial Equity & Social Justice lens.

<u>a.</u> Extraordinary economic or other unusual circumstances beyond the control of all parties ("Extraordinary Circumstances"). Under this factor,

the tenant must provide evidence of the impact of Extraordinary
Circumstances on its financial status, prior prudent efforts to manage risks
and impacts, and efforts made to explore options other than financial or

- c The communities being served by the other party include a substantial proportion of underserved students: students of color; students whose families qualify for free or reduced lunch, students with special needs, emerging bilingual students, or LBGTQ students.

4. To the extent any sale, lease, or disposition below-market terms under this policya lease are granted, the District shall define the time period under the lease during which the below-market terms are effective, after which market terms shall be restored for any remainder of the lease. The factors set out in this section do not override the presumption of maximum market value in every circumstance, but may be considered on a case-by-case basis.

F. Compliance with Grant Agreements.

Notwithstanding any other part of this policy, if District property in a contemplated real estate transaction was purchased with state, federal, or private grant funds, any transaction involving the property shall be made as required in the grant or by state or federal regulations.

G. Delegation of Authority for Certain Transactions

The Board delegates authority to the Superintendent or his/her designee to approve and execute real estate transactions in which the total value of the transaction is at or below applicable delegation thresholds for District expenditure and revenue contracts, as set forth in PPS Public Contracting Rule 45-0200 (Authority to Approve and Execute District Contracts) and); in which conveyance of real property rights-of-way or easements is imposed as a condition of approval of District development and maintenance projects; or in which the transaction can be terminated by the District within 3090 days or less. All other real estate transactions shall require Board approval. The Superintendent will provide a quarterly report to the board Board regarding leases signed below the delegation threshold.

- · Maintain flexibility in lease terms to allow for early termination to adjust to enrollment fluctuations or other District needs for the property; and
- Provide revenue and other support for District needs; in this case, the District must seek maximum long-term financial and other benefits. The District also recognizes that conveyance of real property rights-of-way or easements may be imposed as a condition of approval of District development projects without compensation or may occur for other good or valuable consideration.

D. Sale of Real Property

Under ORS 332.155, the District may lease, sell, and convey all property of the District that will not be required for the District's educational purposes in the long term. In the unlikely event that District property does not support and is not expected to support the District's mission now or in the future, the Superintendent shall recommend to the Board the disposal of such property, including a thorough analysis of the implications of any property sale on fulfillment of the District's educational mission over the long term.

Whenever possible, any long-term disposition of District property should take the form of a long-term lease rather than a sale. A "long-term lease" is defined as a lease of at least five years and shall provide the District termination rights in the event the property is needed for District use.

Sale of a District property without replacing it with an equivalent or better property is usually disfavored and shall be considered only after assessing alternatives and determining that the District's best long-term interests are served by a sale. Whenever possible, any District property sale should be to a public entity that intends to actively use the property for public purposes, provided that any transaction is structured to allow PPS to regain ownership of the real property if it is no longer going to be used for public purposes.

1. Recommendation and Sale Process

a. Sale of District Property Recommendation: The Superintendent shall make recommendations to the Board on the sale of any District property, including an analysis of

implications for the District's ability to fulfill its responsibilities in the short-, medium-, and long-term; and a market analysis.

- b. Public Hearing: Any process to consider the sale of the property shall be a transparent and public process, and at least one public hearing shall be held by the Board prior to declaring any real property or portion thereof prudent and necessary for sale. In the unlikely event the Board determines that it is prudent or necessary to sell a District property, it shall pass a resolution identifying the property, how relinquishing property promotes both the District's mission and the public interest, and the terms and conditions under which it may be sold.
- c. Sale process: Once the Board declares that it is prudent or necessary to sell a District property, the Superintendent, or such persons as may be designated by the Superintendent, shall establish and conduct a process for sale or other conveyance of the property. The Superintendent will market and negotiate a proposed sale or other conveyance of the property and bring a recommended agreement to the Board for the Board's review and approval.

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1. Presumption of Market Terms:

When entering into leases involving real property, the District shall pursue maximum market value and other then-current market terms, unless the Board adopts a resolution that makes an express finding that the transaction involving District property for less than market terms confers significant benefit to the District and the communities it serves. Any express finding justifying less than market terms shall be under extraordinary circumstances, defined as extraordinary or other unusual circumstances beyond the control of the parties ("Extraordinary Circumstances"); consider the factors below or combination of factors; and be assessed through the PPS Racial Equity & Social Justice lens.

The other party must provide evidence of the impact of Extraordinary Circumstances on its financial status, prior prudent efforts to manage risks and impacts, and efforts made to explore options other than financial or other relief from the District.

 Offering below-market terms confers significant benefit to the District or its students, and those benefits substantially outweigh the costs of belowmarket terms;

- b. The communities being served by the other party include a substantial proportion of underserved students: students of color; students whose families qualify for free or reduced lunch, students with special needs, emerging bilingual students, or LBGTQ students;

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- 2. Sale of District Property Recommendation-Public Hearing: Any process to consider the sale of the property shall be a transparent and public process, and at least one public hearing shall be held by the Board prior to declaring any real property or portion thereof appropriate for sale. If the Board determines that a District property is appropriate for sale, it shall pass a resolution identifying the property, how relinquishing property promotes both the District's mission and the public interest, and the terms and conditions under which it may be sold.
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- 4. Presumption of Market Rate: Unless the Board makes an express finding that the disposition of District property for less than market rate confers significant benefit to the District and the communities it serves, the District shall pursue maximum market value for any sale, lease, or disposition under this policy.



Preservation, Maintenance, and Disposition of District Real Property

The Board delegates authority to the Superintendent or his/her designee to approve and execute real estate transactions in which the total value of the transaction is at or below applicable delegation thresholds for District expenditure and revenue contracts, as set forth in PPS Public Contracting Rule 45-0200 (Authority to Approve and Execute District Contracts) and in which the transaction can be terminated by the District within 30 days or less. All other real estate transactions shall require Board approval. The Superintendent will provide a quarterly report to the board regarding leases signed below the delegation threshold.
