

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Enrollment and Program Balancing 2020 Workplan



Introduction

FLO Analytics is working with PPS Communications and Community Engagement to develop and execute a community engagement plan for 2020. 

Roles and Responsibilities

Planning Committee (District-wide thinkers): Charged with providing a recommendation tor the Superintendent/Board

- Evaluates and improves options (exhausts options)
- Takes guidance from District team
- Ambassador of the process to the community

Public (the community perspective): The community is the primary stakeholder

- · Provide feedback online and at open houses,
- Participate through transparency Community perspective

*At least a ratio of 1-to-1
District staff to community
members. Slightly more
community members is ideal.

Selection Process

Community Members:

- Parents
 - Open application process
 - District staff review and select candidates
- Community members
 - Invited

Committee Process

- Data drives the process, not subjectivity
- Iterative process that exhausts options
- ✓ Options are evaluated through the Core Values and Approach as outlined in the Scope of Work
- ✓ Consensus-building ensures voices are heard
- Community feedback essential to scenario modeling
- A transparent process transforms community members into committee members

- Committee members are at the forefront




