Renewals: Key Dates and Meetings

Charter and Alternative Programs Committee Process:

- January 2, 2021 Written request and Application for 5-10 year renewal received by PPS Charter Schools Office
- No later than January 15, 2021 PPS Board Committee meeting to review annual charter authorizing requirements and set calendar
- Week of February 1-5, 2021 PPS Board Committee Work Session for both charter schools to review relevant school data
- Week of February 8-12, 2021 Renewal Public Hearings for Portland Arthur Academy and Opal School (ORS 338.065(5)(c), within 45 days after receiving written renewal request)
- Week of February 15-19, 2021 (If needed meeting is not statutory) Work Session, follow up
 to Renewal Public Hearing, review staff recommendation for both schools, recommend
 resolutions for full Board meeting



Renewals: Key Dates and Meetings

Full School Board Meeting Process:

- March 9, 2021 Charter School renewals as a full board agenda item
 - Board Committee to determine if further presentation from schools is desired
 - ORS 338.065(5)(d), requires full board item within 30 days after public hearing
 - o Board may vote at this meeting if public comment is offered,or
- March 23, 2021 Board vote, If Board vote not held at March 9 meeting
 - Full School Board vote within the business agenda, no presentations
 - ORS 338.065(5)(d), within 30 days after public hearing*
 - *this date falls after 30-days from public hearing, but can be scheduled by mutual agreement with schools

 - Services Begin



 - North, Northeast, Southeast, Southwest


Percent of Students 19 years and older

Comprehensive) High Schools vs. CBO Schools (as of 10/20)




Percentage of Students with Disabilities
